Church Planting Team and College Ministry Report

ECBA Church Planting Report

1. The church planter in Daleville was interrupted by the lockdown and ended up moving out of state. This is old news but perhaps was never put into a report.
2. There is a potential church planter in Upland. Jeremiah Kinney will reach out to him in the next couple of months and explain the ECBA application for financial support.
3. As Team Lead, I, Jeremiah Kinney, am stepping down from this role at the annual meeting. I love church planting, but committee work is not my strong suit.

ECBA College Ministry @ Remedy City report

1. Five students were baptized at Remedy City Church in the last 12 months. The most recent was in May 2022. Of those five:
 - a. Sarah is now an apartment missionary this year with Community Care Network. (More below.)
2. Trent leads Remedy City's social events outreach ("bring a friend to this month's fun event, which is..."). He also bought a house in Muncie upon graduation.
3. Richaun plays in the Remedy City band.
4. Nathan brought over 20 people to church before moving on to grad school.
5. Devan led a Bible study that he has passed on to two underclassmen upon graduation.
2. At least 20 students graduated in May. Between 7-10 of them have stayed on in Muncie and found employment.
3. Three weddings took place. All six individuals were part of the college ministry at RCC.

Two couples bought houses in Muncie. Two grads are now RCC interns.
4. Community Care Network (a ministry led by a member of Living Faith Church in Indianapolis) places couples into

apartment complexes to live rent free in exchange for leading one social event and one spiritual event every two weeks. They are vetted for Christian faith and local church passion. CCN landed a contract with its first Muncie apartment complex and reached out to Remedy City to place a couple there. Remedy City suggested Grant and Sarah Byman, and CCN trained and placed them in Chateau Apartments (Walnut St, Muncie) in July. Ongoing support and discipleship continues.

5. Pastor Jeremiah Kinney of Remedy City is asking for continued financial support from ECBA for the college ministry: \$200/mo for salary support; \$50/mo toward a monthly church lunch.
6. Remedy City has moved to Halteman Village's location and has little signage. Once they get quotes, would ECBA be willing to contribute a couple thousand dollars to help purchase a sign or signs? The 100% word-of-mouth "marketing" of RCC could be enhanced by signage.

WMU Overview - The East Central Baptist Association WMU Team hosted a WMU information night at Halteman Village on Saturday, June 4th. An overview of WMU along with a brainstorming session on how to restart missions in our churches after Covid were the main topics. Seven of our ECBA churches attended.

GROW Night - The East Central Baptist Association WMU Team hosted a GROW Night (Go Reach Our World) on Thursday, May 26th at Wasson Nursery in Muncie, Indiana. 30 women attended the event from 5 area churches and raised \$720 for missions. State Leadership - Tami Hubler was voted in at the SCBI WMU Business meeting and will serve a second term

as the WMU Vice President for the State of Indiana.

Youth Scholarship - Youth Missions Scholarships are available from the ECBA. Interested churches please contact Tami Hubler (765.356.3648). The scholarships are available on a first come, first served basis. Youth must fill out an application form, attend an SCBI church in the ECBA Association, and receive a letter of recommendation from their pastor. If granted a scholarship, the youth must present an overview of their mission trip (with pictures) to their home church and at one of the associational meetings in the year they travel.

Youth Scholarship Update (September): Due to the lack of inquiry from our ECBA churches, the ECBA WMU is currently working with Liberty Christian School in Anderson, IN. Liberty will be taking high school students on a mission trip to the Dominican Republic. Several of these students attend ECBA churches. Information on the scholarship and the application will be shared with students who meet the qualifications listed above.

Men's Ministry - Joe Fox, Old Town Hill, will continue to serve in the Men's Ministry Role in 2023.

VBS/Children's Ministry - Brenda Brooks, Redeemer, will continue to serve in the VBS/Children's Ministry role in 2023.

shared a report from the state. He encouraged attendance at the upcoming annual state meeting, The Summit, at Highland Lakes Baptist Camp on October 24-25, plus the Association Leaders Retreat September 26-27, and the Bi-Vocational Pastors and wives retreat on March 25-26. Additionally, John provided information about available funds for our churches from NAMB. John will also be presenting our Leader Lab training on Church Revitalization after our next Quarterly Meeting.

Bob Weeks, President of the Baptist Foundation, explained that the foundation had partnered with WatersEdge Ministry Services who, for over 75 years, has "financially empowered donors and ministries to transform lives with the Gospel of Jesus Christ...As the foundation's primary service provider, WatersEdge offers a suite of services to Indiana Baptists, from estate planning, scholarships and charitable giving for families and individuals, to loans, investments and accounting services for churches and ministries."

Under old business, the constitutional change motion made at the last quarterly meeting was addressed. This motion would have done away with the May and November Quarterly Meetings, leaving the Association to meet for a semi-annual meeting in March and annual meeting in September. The vote was an

even split and since it required a 2/3 vote, it was declined.

The nominating committee, Tim Overton, Bruce Reynolds and Greg Haisley, presented their recommended slate of officers. Voted in for the 2022-23 year were: Moderator – Bill Peters (Kingston); Vice-Moderator – Jearme Ousley (Redeemer); Clerk – Melissa Ousley (Redeemer); Treasurer – Pat Storm (Redeemer); Assistant Treasurer – Stephanie Ross (North Delaware); Parliamentarian – Jon Nichols; and Trustees – Tom Brooks (Redeemer) and Shawn Hollingsworth (Kingston), and Church Planting Team Leader—Tim Overton (Kingston). The Church Health team leader, Tami Hubler (New Day) and the Association Ministry Team Leader, Sharon Armstrong (Old Town Hill) were voted in at the Semi-Annual meeting.

The budget for the 2023 fiscal year had not been correctly included in the book of reports and will be presented at the November Quarterly Meeting. Other business included 2022-23 meeting arrangements and resolutions. Bill Peters announced that Ryan Strother had been confirmed as speaker for the 2023 Annual Meeting so this could be added to the arrangements report. Bill also shared that we had received a copy of a letter sent by First Baptist Church in Montpelier withdrawing from the Southern Baptist Convention and therefore, they would no longer be part of our association.

Joe Fox made a motion to spend up to \$5,000 from restricted funds to provide air conditioning for the new concession/block party trailer. This motion was seconded and approved. Joe also made a motion to purchase a 30 X 100 foot building to house the DR equipment because of recent thefts in their area. Chris Hubler volunteered to keep the equipment at their location since they have not had any trouble in their area. Joe agreed to this and withdrew his motion.

With no further business, Bill announced that our next meeting will be on November 3rd at Kingston Avenue Baptist Church in Anderson. There will be a fellowship meal at 6 pm and the meeting will begin at 7 pm. The business portion of the meeting was adjourned then closed with prayer by moderator, Bill Peters.

Jearme Ousley had been scheduled to present a message at this meeting but was unable to attend due to illness. Tim Overton provided a message from 3 John which promoted cooperation among churches. In this passage, John encourages love that does not rejoice in iniquity but tells the truth. It also endorsed finding contentment in faithfulness. The world is not going to fund the gospel or missionaries. We need to remain faithful in supporting the spread of the gospel. Tim closed the evening in prayer.
